CREMATORIA NEWS

Work to repair Pleasington Crematorium which was 'badly damaged' in a huge fire earlier this month is progressing 'well' with the council hoping to reopen the Blackburn facility soon. The blaze broke out on the grounds on June 8th with eight fire engines called to the scene. Around 20 to 30 people were thought to be inside at the time. All services scheduled since the incident have been cancelled. The fire service spent nearly four hours tackling the fire and Blackburn with Darwen Council said the blaze started in or around an outdoor storage compound next to the cremation room. This room houses the two cremator machines. Neither of the cremator machines were switched on at the time the fire started and two other rooms within the crematorium building – the plant room and the chapel itself - sustained only smoke damage. Council bosses said they are hopeful that the building can reopen for cremation services 'in late July'. Work is currently underway at the site to refurbish the cremation room which was badly damaged in the fire. Martin Eden, Strategic Director of Environment & Operations, said: "So far, everything is going well on site, with lots of partnership working between different trades and contractors. When we have a firmer idea of exactly when services can be held at the crematorium again, our Cemeteries Team will give funeral directors two weeks' notice to allow them to start booking the crematorium again." Mercia Forest Crematorium, in Broad Lane, Essington, has been built to serve the communities of Walsall, Wolverhampton, Cannock and surrounding areas and officially opened its doors this month. The team is led by Joanne Taylor, who is delighted to be the first-ever manager at what is one of the most environmentally-friendly crematoriums in the country. Joanne has worked in the funeral industry for 12 years in a wide number of roles before joining Westerleigh Group, and stated that: "My aim is to make Mercia Forest Crematorium a place where everyone feels welcome, a truly multi-denominational space for the bereaved. I believe this crematorium will be a brilliant addition to the surrounding communities, providing much-needed gardens of remembrance and a space for people to reflect and remember their loved ones in a way that is uniquely personal to them. We don't only care about the bereaved; we also care about the climate, which is why we have the latest in advanced filtration and abatement technology, which reduces pollution, as well as a programme of protecting and creating new wildlife habitats, retaining trees and enhancing native planting." CREMATORIA NEWS

A new crematorium will be built between Fareham and Gosport after plans were given the green light by councillors. Fareham Borough Council's planning committee has approved plans for a new facility on land north of Brune Lane – otherwise known as the 'Horse Field'. The plans, submitted by Mercia Crematorium Developments Limited, address capacity issues experienced at the Portchester Crematorium due to increasing population, death and cremation rates. Residents and community groups had raised fears about the impact the scheme could have on traffic and the suitability of the site's location. Councillor Nick Walker, chairman of the planning committee said: 'We had officers in Hampshire county council highways department come along and confirmed that as far as they were concerned, all the highway arrangements that have been made fit with all the latest protocols. There was a number of deputations that were written, but every question was answered, it was a wellwritten report and it was unanimously approved by members.' The crematorium chapel will provide up to 90 seats but internal folding doors could increase the capacity to 130 if the entrance vestibule is used. Visitors will use the main entrance, through the chapel and leave through the south exit porte cochere through a flower garden. For the full article please visit: the Portsmouth News website.

An East Lancashire crematorium has been given an interior designer makeover. The **Burnley** funeral site has seen extensive refurbishment works to the entrance, waiting area, and chapel. The work has helped modernise the building so it is functional, modern, comfortable, and calming. **Bev Wood**, founder of Lytham St Annes-based commercial interior designers **BWD Ltd**, said: "We highlighted existing features, such as the beautiful stained-glass windows, reflecting the plum colour within them in the soft furnishings and paint colour, bringing these assets to life. BWD felt the waiting area needed a focal point, so we created a new, key feature with a stretch ceiling. We printed material with a calming sky, seen through treetops, then backlit this with lighting on dimmers, to control the amount of light required." To ensure that the space was useable and accessible for all, the lectern was altered to allow space for a wheelchair, along with the ability to adapt the height of the lectern to suit various speakers. Waltham Forest Council has approved funding to build a "flagship" new crematorium in Chingford. A new "contemporary, purpose-built" crematorium in Chingford Mount Cemetery would replace the current temporary mortuary compound set up during the pandemic. The council is developing designs for a 450sqm building including a waiting area, family viewing area, chapel, crematorium space and office area. A report approving an £8.4m budget was approved last week, stating that the council hopes to make a large "return on investment" through a profit of £21million over 25 years. The report says a new service would need to carry out about 1,200 cremations per year at a fee of about £900 each. It adds that benefits of a new crematorium include easing "funeral day logistics", accommodating residents of diverse beliefs, reducing traffic and creating additional revenue. Neither of the two design options being considered have been published by the council and a planning application has not yet been submitted. However, the report says designs include fridge storage and two modern electric cremators, which would "significantly reduce" emissions compared to those that use gas. Plymouth's new crematorium is taking shape, with works on its café and wake facility beginning earlier this month. Located away from the main building, near the entrance to the site, there will be a café open to serve refreshments for people attending funerals and also for those visiting the site to pay their respects. Crucially, though, it will also be available for families to hire for wakes, with rooms to accommodate up to 40 guests. The new crematorium, off Haye Road in Plympton, is being constructed by the Kier Group and will be known as The Park. It is due to open in Spring 2024. Cllr Sally Haydon, cabinet member for community safety, libraries, cemeteries & crematoria, said: "This is another crucial construction milestone on the journey to The Park, Plymouth's new, state-of-the-art crematorium." The new crematorium buildings will nestle into the slope of the site and Plymouth Limestone is being used. Outside, reflective spaces, designed for memorialisation and scatterings will embrace the local environment and ecology. When the new crematorium is built, it will replace existing facilities at Efford and Weston Mill, which will continue to be active for burial and memorials. New Forest Crematorium Manager Graeme Horobin said: "We're very pleased to have hosted this special event and dedicated our beautiful crematorium to the communities we serve. This is such a unique place where exceptional care is at the heart of everything we do. We also work very hard with families to create uniquely personal services for their loved ones." New Forest Crematorium features advanced technology which helps to minimise emissions and makes it one of the most environmentally facilities of its kind in the country. This approach ensures that it does not only minimise pollution in the local community, it also protects existing wildlife habitats and nature of the surrounding New Forest National Park. 
