

CREMATORIA NEWS

Derby City Council's cabinet has approved proposals to allocate £889,501 for the design of a new crematorium at Markeaton.

The Labour-run council said equipment and the building at the existing crematorium - which opened in 1956 - were either "reaching or were beyond the end of their lifespan". Councillor Paul Hezelgrave said: "We do need to have this facility, a city of this size should be able to have an attractive place for people to say their last goodbye to their dear ones." Derby City Council said it looked at the option of refurbishing the current building but concluded it would cause a "high level" of disruption to services. Council documents added the "most urgent" concern was that the site's cremators were beyond "end of life and at risk of failure". The authority said developing a new crematorium, on the land next to the existing building, was the "most effective" way to secure a long-term service. Proposed crematorium to meet 'pressing need' for new facility

Specialist crematorium provider, Horizon, has revealed pre-application plans for a new crematorium off Methley Lane in Oulton, Leeds. It will complement Leeds City Council's own crematoria – which currently serve the north, west and south of the city – and is intended to meet both the current and future need for crematoria in the area. The proposal includes a chapel with space for more than 100 visitors, car parking, and memorial gardens, all set within landscaped grounds. Stephen Byfield, director at Horizon Cremation, said: "Nearly 85 per cent of families choose cremation over burial and there is now a pressing need for new facilities in Leeds which will only increase over the coming years. "We believe our proposal represents the best option to serve the south and east of the city. "The crematorium will be well-situated, is easily accessible by car and public transport, is beautifully designed and has been carefully integrated into the landscape to minimise visual impact." Wilford Hill Crematorium: £1.3m investment needed or service could close by 2027

A report going before Nottingham City Council's Commissioning and Procurement Executive Committee will ask councillors to decide whether to continue offering cremation services at Wilford Hill Crematorium by replacing its ageing equipment — or to end the service altogether when new national regulations come into force in 2027. The committee will consider whether to replace the cremators, decommission the old equipment, and invest in new FTIII cremators and cooling systems — or to cease providing a cremation service once the current equipment can no longer legally or safely operate. If councillors back the replacement plan, a total budget of £1.36 million would be allocated to the project, funded through £918,765 in reserves and £444,735 from capital, with an additional £150,000 contingency for slippage or unforeseen costs. The new cremators would be installed in phases to allow services to continue without interruption. Wilford Hill is one of Nottingham's key cremation sites and forms part of the city's wider Bereavement Services, which also manages public health funerals and cemeteries. £350k crematorium upgrade follows funeral firm takeover

A funeral firm has invested £350,000 into the facilities and grounds of a Lichfield crematorium site it purchased last year. Upgrades and improvements follow the acquisition of Chase and District Crematorium and Memorial Park by A.W. Lymn The Family Funeral Service with the site being rebranded as Hammerwich Crematorium and Cemetery. Improvements have included a complete chapel refurbishment including new doors and ceiling, brand new air conditioning throughout, a new state-of-the-art audio/visual system, a new canopy for vehicles pulling up and leaving the site and a complete re-tarmac of the whole site. Work has also been undertaken to increase the amount of car parking space available from 19 spaces to 52. The number of cremations being conducted at the site had doubled before the refurbishment work was completed. Hammerwich Crematorium and Cemetery Manager Jane Baker said: "It's incredibly exciting to witness this level of care and investment being brought into the site. A.W. Lymn's vision for Hammerwich aligns perfectly with our hopes for the future and the improvements already taking shape show just how committed our new owners are to local families." Maldon Fields Dedication Service

An official service of dedication has taken place for the new crematorium at Maldon Fields, which opened in December last year. The Bishop of Bradwell, the Rt Rev Adam Atkinson, led the service, alongside a host of local dignitaries and representatives from across the faith spectrum.

Maldon Fields Crematorium is situated off the Maldon Road at Woodham Mortimer, nestled behind a copse. Throughout the service of dedication, speakers complimented the unobtrusive building in its landscaped countryside setting.

Cllr Kevin Lagan, Mayor of Maldon District Council, spoke of "The absolute beauty of the idea behind it, the location, the care – I would use the word love - of how it has been built. I know that every single Councillor who represents the district of Maldon is proud to have this beautiful facility."

Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Essex Dr. James Bettley read from the Bible, as did Father Jerold Terrance of Assumption of Our Lady, Maldon's Roman Catholic Church. Kate Milner, a local civil celebrant who led one of the first funerals at Maldon Fields, spoke of how the new crematorium allowed people to tell their own story.

Reverend Peter Begley, the Area Dean of Maldon and Dengie summed up the day with the words: "This is more than a crematorium, its Maldon Fields."

New state-of-the-art crematorium opens in East Lothian

Scotland's newest crematorium has officially opened on the outskirts of Musselburgh.

The privately-run <u>East Lothian Crematorium & Memorial Gardens</u> has a chapel with seating for up to 112 people and additional standing space provided by the entrance lobby and the chapel's canopy. It also boasts state-of-the-art technology which the operators say allows uniquely personalised funeral services, with projections onto the full wall at the front of the chapel with accompanying soundscapes and lighting. Details of the service will be displayed on the chapel's welcome screens and the waiting room has been fitted with a digital photo gallery to show loved ones' images.

East Lothian Crematorium & Memorial Gardens is part of Westerleigh Group, one of the UK's largest independent owners and operators of crematoria and cemeteries, with 42 sites in England, Scotland and Wales. Manager David Lees said: "Now that we are open, we are able to start supporting local families with the exceptional care and standards of service that Westerleigh Group is well-known for. We're particularly pleased to be the first crematorium in Scotland to have this incredible technology which takes the funeral experience to a whole new level."

The crematorium, on Old Craighall Road, also has technology which the operators say makes it one of the most environmentally-friendly facilities of its kind in the country. A zonal heating system and the use of low-energy lighting will help reduce the crematorium's dependency on external sources of energy. Crematorium dispute to be heard in November

A legal challenge over a proposed crematorium in Aspropyrgos, west of **Athens**, is set to be heard on November 18 at the Piraeus Administrative Court of Appeal. The case was filed by Crem Services SA after the municipal council cancelled a preliminary building permit last year, citing environmental concerns and local opposition.

The mayor of Aspropyrgos said the facility would threaten the quality of life for more than 200 families and emphasized that burial is closely tied to local religious traditions, which "they do not wish to disrupt."

Crem Services argues that the site is zoned for wholesale commercial use, not residential, and that the objections concern minor plot issues rather than neighborhood presence.

Six years after Greece's first crematorium opened in Ritsona, north of Athens, the expansion of cremation facilities nationwide has largely stalled. While a public crematorium project in Thessaloniki is progressing, plans in Athens, in the area of Elaionas, and Patra remain on hold.

The Ritsona facility performs around 5,000 cremations annually and serves as a model for future developments. To read the full article, head over to **www.ekathimerini.com**

City's Festival of the Dead seeks to break taboos

People in **Bradford** are being encouraged to break the taboo of talking about death by taking part in a festival in the city focusing on the subject. During the **Festival of the Dead**, free workshops will be held throughout October and November for people to discuss death and reflect on how the dead are remembered, with a commemorative lantern parade also planned for next month.

The two-month festival was organised by the University of Bradford and other local organisations as part of the City of Culture year. Prof Karina Croucher, from the university, said it was intended "not to be sad, but actually to encourage people to celebrate life and enjoy life and make the most of what we have got". Prof Croucher, whose research in archaeology looks at differences in how the dead have been treated through time and across the world, said: "Death is universal, but people still find it really difficult to talk about. But talking about it doesn't make it happen."

Attendees would be able to make their own commemorative paper lanterns at weekly workshops at the City Library, with their creations used as part of the parade in Shipley's Northcliffe Park on 16 November, organisers said. The workshops would be a "safe and open space to talk about death", Prof Croucher said. "Just because someone is dead, that's not the end of their significance in our lives. They are still important to us and it's OK to acknowledge that."
