Government guidance continues to be published on a regular basis and we continue to liaise with the Government and devolved administrations over the continuing easing of lockdown measures and the implications for the funeral sector.

CREMATORIA NEWS

A new £8.5m crematorium could be built in East Yorkshire under new plans. **East Riding Council** is putting in motion proposals for the new facility which will be built close to Preston in **Holderness**. Cabinet approval is being sought, in principle, to consult and develop a business case to build the crematorium. The council has identified a need for a new crematorium because of the time it takes for people to travel to existing sites from the Holderness area. More details of a new crematorium in Heaton have been revealed by Bradford Council. As part of major changes to its bereavement services, the Council plans to replace two crematoria and refurbish a third. Nab Wood Crematorium will be shut under the plans, with a replacement facility built at Long Lane in Heaton, next to Northcliffe Golf Club. A planning application for the development has now been submitted, and includes artists impressions of the crematorium building and garden of remembrance. The Council's Bereavement Strategy will also see Scholemoor Crematorium closed, with a new facility built on a field off Shetcliffe Lane, Bierley. Oakworth Crematorium will be demolished and re-built. For more details on Bradford Council's proposals, please read the <u>Telegraph & Argus article.</u>

Stourbridge Crematorium will close for four months for urgent refurbishment works to be carried out. The crematorium in South Road will close on the afternoon of Friday 31st July and re-open at the start of December. Ageing cremators at the site will be replaced with new machines designed to accommodate larger coffins. A small extension will also be built on the side of the crematorium to accommodate the new cremators. You can read more details in the <u>Halesowen News article</u>.

The Westerleigh Group has unveiled an artist's impression of how its new memorial gardens to remember people who have died during the COVID-19 pandemic, will look. Westerleigh announced last month its intention to create a memorial garden at each of its 34 sites across the country. The gardens are designed to be tranquil places for people to visit and remember loved ones who died during the pandemic, and to pay tribute to those who sacrificed so much to help others who were sick, isolated or vulnerable. Roger Mclaughlan, CEO of Westerleigh said: "The centre-piece of each garden will be a stone monument surrounded by a floral arrangement representing a rainbow, which has become a symbol of hope during the pandemic. The West Hertfordshire Crematorium Joint Committee (WHCJC) has commissioned the submission of a full planning application on their behalf in respect to land south west of Bedmond Road, Bunkers Park, Hemel Hempstead. In the Planning Statement, submitted with the plans, it says: "This application seeks full planning permission for the construction of a single storey, single chapel crematorium with associated parking, landscaping and infrastructure on land adjacent to the new cemetery located off Bedmond Road that has recently been completed by Dacorum Borough Council (DBC)". Plymouth's newest crematorium has been brought to life in an amazing new virtual tour of the facility in eastern Plymouth. The fly-through gives people an idea of how the new facility will look - with a sleek and modern, one storey exterior. Inside there are light and open ceremony spaces featuring large windows to fit the theme of the modern quality facility. The new crematorium will be set in 17 acres of countryside on the eastern edge of the city, off Merafield Road near the Stag Lodge entrance to **Saltram Park**. CREMATORIA NEWS

Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council faces extra costs of £3.4 million to build a crematorium outside Hinckley. Planners at the Council have approved a fresh £6.9 million budget to build the facility outside the town, up from previous projections of some £4.9 million in capital costs for delivery of the complex, by the A47, near the town's football stadium. A Council update on the scheme also said that the increased costs may take the council over the partial exemption limit for VAT, adding a further 20 per cent (£1.4 million) to the bill if the Council directly owns and runs the crematorium. The report directed councillors to consider the options of selling the site to an operator or arranging a partnership where a company delivers services for the Council, similar to how Hinckley Leisure Centre is managed. REPUBLIC OF IRELAND NEWS

The long-running application to build a crematorium in **North Cork** has finally been concluded following a decision by An Bord Pleanála ruling against the facility. An Bord Pleanála has decided to uphold Cork County Council's ruling against the crematorium following an appeal by Classic Lodges (Ireland) Ltd. In their ruling, council planners cited one reason for the refusal saying that on the basis of the information submitted they were "not satisfied that the proposed development would not adversely impact on public health and the environment by reason of serious air pollution". The **Children's Funeral Fund** introduced in England last year reached its first anniversary on 23 July 2020. Since its inception, nearly 3000 claims have been made to help bereaved parents with the costs of burying or cremating their child. INTERNATIONAL NEWS

The Health Council of the Netherlands has produced an advisory report at the request of the Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations, in which it produces a framework against which to analyse new methods of disposing of the dead. The Council concluded that the framework would require three values to be satisfied: safety, dignity and sustainability. The report concludes that in principle, the process of alkaline hydrolysis complies with the values of the framework but that technical specifications would have to be further examined before this way of disposing of the dead could potentially be authorised. The report also examines the process of human composting but concludes that insufficient information is currently available to assess this process against the framework.
